28th April – Drive It Day – was a lovely day and nine members of the South & West Wales Area Centre in five Imps gathered at Usk Garden Centre – a mile or so out of Usk on the minor road between Usk and Caerleon – ready for the start of the run.

Pre-run refreshment was taken in the café while the cars

were being admired by visitors to the garden centre (after all, the whole idea of Drive It Day is to show the general public classic cars in use). Before we started we persuaded an interested member of the public to take a photo of all of us with the cars then off we went towards Caerleon, passing, with care(!), the occasional group of dedicated cyclists normally found on this and other winding roads at weekends. The route ran through Caerleon village and over the Usk River bridge before turning off to go up the south side of the Usk River along very attractive minor roads, through bluebell woods and past anemone covered verges, to Usk and then mostly on B roads to Chepstow for lunch. Again the cars proved an attraction and while eating lunch we watched people admiring them.

Lunch over and we were soon travelling on minor roads into the Forest of Dean and across the Wye River bridge, then back on the A466 through Tintern. Parts of this very scenic road alongside the Wye had suffered landslides in the winter storms and there were stretches that had been reduced to single-lane tracks controlled by traffic lights. However, the traffic lights were kind to us and the five Imps managed to stay together. In Chepstow we turned west towards Caerwent and then headed to Caldicot where we parked up at the Country Park and castle – another chance for the public to see the Imps – and for us to look around the castle and exhibitions as well as enjoy an ice cream in the sunshine.

The final section of the run was from Caldicot back to the car park by the amphitheatre in Caerleon where we wandered around and admired the impressive Roman remains.

It was an enjoyable day; the run totalled 75 miles in excellent weather.

We were surprised not to see more classics out on the roads – all we saw was an MGB GT, a Sunbeam Alpine, and a (very stately) large Bentley (or possibly Daimler) saloon. However, there were loads of off-road motorcycles in convoy going the opposite way at times; there must have been a special event somewhere near.
